Bits and Pieces

On the 10th of August, a delegation from Norway Stromme Foundation came to visit HTPVK. Sec. General for Stromme Foundation, Mr. Erik Lunde, along with Mr. Titus Tenga, and Mr. Gase Handeland, all from Norway, and South Sudan office staff, visited for one day to see the Nursery programs, and to speak with the Bonga Girls and CMSG participants. The delegation was entertained by the singing and dancing children and the Toposa people. The tour included a visit to a typical Toposa Village and a look at the bridge and office compound. After fruitful meetings the delegation returned to Juba via MAF plane.

Bonga Girls: "At first, our parents refused us to join. They thought we were being trained to be stubborn. But another group continued. The parents of the first group saw how the Bonga Girls were better and more productive. They then allowed us girls to join again."

Bonga Girl Member: "Our hygiene is one thing that has improved. We are not ignorant anymore. Before, our culture was not to wash. Now we know the importance of keeping clean. "



The Green Dump Truck and the Green Tractor are inoperable until the spare parts can be brought from outside. The Yellow lorry also had to be serviced and repaired before it moved on to Juba to pick up needed construction materials.

The Grinding Mill was repaired and it is working. It is currently grossing between 10 and 15 USD per week. The funds generated are used for operation and maintenance of the machine.

One staff was injured when his motorcycle fell on his leg sustaining only a swollen ankle. He is recovering in HTPVK.

Vocational Training


Brother John Ogenda has been giving ongoing lessons on Simple Mechanical Service training. There are 11 enrolled students and 7 attend full time. Students are from P8, S1 and S2 and are given theory and practice for how to maintain a vehicle. A supplemental Vehicle Driving Class had 11 students who have received Certificates of Participation.

Practical use and care of tools is another class offered to the students by the VTC teaching staff.

Peace Building

In Late July, Toposa youth stole 7 cattle from Jie in Kasangor. There were no injuries. These cows were promptly returned as the chiefs said there has not been any serious problems between Jie and Toposa for almost 5 years and they wanted to maintain the peace. There was no punishment for the theft.

In August, 4 Toposa youth killed one Murle man and were captured shortly afterwards in the Boma area. They were placed in detention in Boma and are told they must compensate the family before release. The case is at the State level.

A meeting was held in HTPVK to address these issues with the chiefs and local elders. This meeting also included discussion about the robberies at the Primary School.

A Survey on Sexual Exploitation was done with 5 workers interviewing some 100 participants in Kapoeata Town. Results are still pending as the staff collate the data.

Livelihoods

Even though the drought continues, it is amazing how a little rain can help. After just one day of light rainfall, the sorghum crops somehow recovered to the point of at least producing small fruit on the stalks. This hardy cereal grain is really appropriate for such semi-arid climates. It seems the Toposa of this area will have something of a small harvest to help out through the coming months. Honey also has been plentiful this harvest season. Many of these beehives are a result of the motivation and training of the Peace Village staff. The sale of honey brings cash income to the family.



Primary Health Care Centre

On the 19th of August, a government Covid 19 vaccination program through MOH was done in the surrounding villages with the help of the HTPVK Clinic staff.

Since the nutritional supplements were stolen in July, fewer women have come to the PHCC this month as there are no food hand outs.

The PHCC currently has: 1 Clinical Physician, 2 midwives, 4 nurses, 1 lab technician, a registrar and a cleaner.

Secondary School

The Second Classroom structure for the Secondary School, funded jointly by Caritas Austria and ProSudan Assoc. Austria, has the roof trusses in place and zinc sheets are placed. The foundation for the Third Classroom structure, funded by the People's Rep. of China Embassy, has been dug and leveled. Preparations for the latrine has begun. The Secondary School administration will accept few female students this term due to limited space in the dormitory.

Primary School

WFP brought a truck and parked it in the School Compound. A gang of youth came and took the oil and some food. The children were traumatized. Some days later some more youth came and took cooking pans from the kitchen. The recently installed new inverter has burned out and the school is without power again. Another inverter will have to be purchased. A temporary latrine is being dug near the boys dormitory until funding for a permanent structure can be secured. (right)

Success Story Peter Lomoje Lotyam A Primary School Graduate Returns to Serve His People

Peter Lomoje Lotyam visits his old **Primary School**

My name is Peter Lomoje Lotyam and I was born 25 years ago in 1997. My father is Lotyam Lopuon and my mother is Namerimong Lotyam. I am the oldest of nine children but my father has five more wives so I really don't know how many children we are. I was born in Napwatasigiria Village, Kauto Payam which is about a days walk from Kuron. As a boy I tended goats and cattle just like the others. I slept in the bush, and shot the gun. Once I met a hyena and had to yell for help and it ran away.

Even though I was the eldest with lots of responsibility, my father let me go to school at my insistence. He had other children to watch the animals so I was allowed to follow my dream.

I started nursery school at Kuron Peace Village in 2007. I entered the St. Thomas Primary School in 2008 and finished my study in 2015. I went to Narus and attend-

ed Secondary at Lopua Memorial government school which is helped by the St. Patrick Fathers. I graduated in 2019 and was lucky to get a job right away with OPRD, an NGO that helps with food aid in Eastern Equatoria. So now I am a Food Monitor and I have chosen to work right here in my home area. My parents are so proud of me and my father said that now he can be happy that his son is able to help the family in case of a food shortage or other problem. I am currently planning to send several of my fam-

ily members to school.

I remember one of my teachers telling me to work hard so one day I will help my family and community. And it seems that is what is hap-In my adolescent years I was rather destructive and head strong. I would break school rules like meeting with girls and walking with them. I remember early on in my school studies I was very stubborn and undisciplined. With some of my classmates, we

broke into the school garden and ate all the harvest destroying the garden. I got 30 lashes with the cane for that but I was lucky they didn't kick me out of school. Thanks be to God I was allowed to stay in school.

One thing that changed me was the Church. I kept close to the Church. We had a very serious choir. I read the Bible. This is probably what saved me from more trouble. I also stayed in the Peace Village Compound during breaks with friends. I also had a cousin who is older and he gave me advice. He was a good role model. He took me under his wing and kept me from making bigger mistakes.



The toughest thing for me was getting school fees. I come from a pastoralist community so we don't pay in money. We give a goat, but then my family thinks that one goat one year will cover all the years of the school. Toposa don't like to give away their animals for anything.

Holy Trinity Peace Village Kuron has contributed not only to me but to the entire Toposa community, especially in Kauto County. If not for HTPVK I would still be in the village and even most likely dead from a cattle raid or some violence as our people like to do. I really thank the Founder of this place. (Bishop Paride Taban) I was fed, educated and really raised as a man in this village.
