Honey production has a long history with the Toposa people. They have been cultivating bees and collecting honey as long as any of the elders can remember. What is new is that there is a market now in South Sudan and the sale of honey can be a lucrative business.

Mr. Nakii is from Gumariang village. He has been living in this area his whole life. He has always had cattle. When he was younger, he often went on cattle raids. He was lucky to never


be wounded during these dangerous raids. Now he

has decided to stop that and concentrate on agriculture. He has been active in many of the previous programs HTPVK has promoted.

Mr. Nakii Lomor has become interested in the agricultural activities through the constant presence of the Kuron Peace Village Agricluturalist, Mr. Juma Chelimo. When bees were discussed at a past workshop, Mr. Nakii liked the idea. It made sense to his entrepreneurial thinking. have always tried to think of ways to get money to support my family. I am
